Skills that employers are looking for	How those skills are built into our syllabus
Written communication skills	Training in, and expectation of, high order writing skills is embedded at all levels of our degree programme in essays, projects, and final year dissertation. Use feedback and 1-1 tutorials to enhance. Faculty writing fellows also provide support.
Oral communication skills	Seminar presentations in all years, group presentations in years 1 and 2. Participation in seminar discussions. Participation in one-to-one tutorials
Critical and analytical thinking	Embedded at all levels and in all aspects of our teaching
Problem solving abilities – i.e. the ability to research a problem, find and analyse appropriate sources related to that problem, and produce a coherent, well-informed, and well-written analysis that leads to cogent conclusions.	Embedded at all levels, but a particular feature of the primary source Special Topic and Special Field projects in years 1 and 2, the Group Project in year 2 and the final year dissertation.
Self-management and motivation	Embedded at all levels in a programme of <u>active</u> learning, but a particular feature of the primary source ST and SF projects, the year 2 Group Project and the final year dissertation.
	The keys to success: meeting (and setting) deadlines, learning to manage your own time, attention to detail, meeting goals, working on your own but enlisting help where it is appropriate to do so, making your own decisions.
Reliability	Embedded at all levels via attendance requirements and set deadlines for you to meet. Often referred to in references at the request of the employer.
Team working	1 st year group presentation, 2 nd year group project presentation. Requires you to work cooperatively to achieve goals identified by your team.
Computer skills	IT courses available on demand in all years. Use of PowerPoint in presentations and other software tools as required.
An understanding of business	Not built in as such, though some units do engage with it. Note that, since business is an intrinsic part of society, there is nothing to stop you engaging with it through your studies more generally.
