

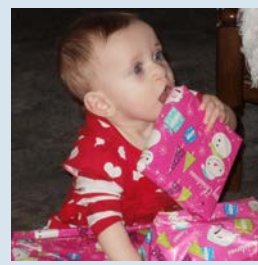

It's been a fantastic year for The Cleft Collective Cohort Studies!

Cleft teams in Birmingham, Swansea, Guy's and St. Thomas', Bristol, Manchester, Great Ormond Street, Oxford, Nottingham, Edinburgh and Salisbury are now recruiting families. Cleft teams in Chelmsford and Liverpool are also due to start recruiting in the New Year.

So far, we have recruited over 1,000 individuals (including mothers, fathers, children with cleft and siblings) from almost 350 families.

This represents a huge achievement and the research team is extremely grateful to everyone who has been involved to date.

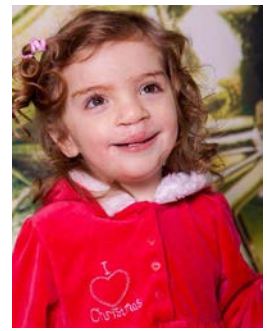

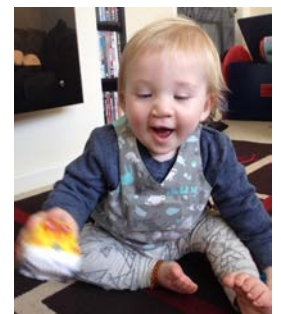

The Cleft Collective Speech and Language Study has begun!

Following a successful pilot, families who are involved in The Cleft Collective Birth Cohort in Birmingham are now being invited to participate in the speech and language study. This new project will follow children's speech and language development in the first three years and begins with asking parents to record their child's speech using a special recording device called LENA.
