As Bristol's new curriculum MB21 rolls out, some students who were on the previous MB16 curriculum are returning to studies either from intercalating or taking time out. As they have not experienced the new curriculum in Years 1 and 2 we need to support them in navigating the transition. We would like them to experience a half day in General Practice on Thursday 20th June. Can you help by taking a group of 3-4 students on the morning and or afternoon of the 20th June? You would run a teaching session for the group and bring in a patient for the students to meet and practice history and examination with, in preparation for year 3. How accessible is your surgery? Do you have a 'quiet' space?

As we place students with a range of disabilities or access needs, it is important to have information about accessibility of venues. If you do not have an access statement for your surgery, we would recommend that you engage the services of **AccessAble**, a fantastic resource created by disabled people, which you can find at

This group has surveyed thousands of venues across the UK and Ireland, including shops, pubs, cinemas, universities, hospitals and more and hosts access guides on its site. You can contact AccessAble to commission an access guide for your surgery on hello@accessable.co.uk or **01438 842 710**. They can arrange a survey and report of your surgery, which will be hosted on their website. Costs can vary. This would be of significant benefit to students and be of benefit for your patients and other visitors to your surgery.

As you may be aware, our student body includes students who need facilities for regular prayer. We have been requested to ask GP surgeries if there is anywhere within their buildings that could be used as a prayer space for students who need this facility.


