You can search by media or theme or condition, and even comment on the artists' work. Here is a quote from the site:

"It is a matter of fact that the themes that cluster round health and disease (death, loss, salvation, fate, serendipity, choice) are also those that preoccupy artists. So there is a real wealth of fine art that can inform us about the human response to disease."

The work is a pleasure and interest to view and also a useful teaching tool. For example for another perspective on a condition, ensuring a whole person view and preventing students from focusing only on clinical aspects of disease. A tool to encourage reflection and ideas and inspiration for students planning their own creative work.

Recently, with year 1 students, we used it when discussing a patient with Multiple Sclerosis. It enhanced their understanding of the condition and provided insight to the patient experience. It was great to use a different tool for teaching, engaging with different parts of the students' minds and it facilitated reflection well.
