Q1. What is the LeDeR programme?

A. The LeDeR programme supports local areas to check up on the deaths of people with learning disabilities in England.



Q 2. What is a reviewer?

A. A reviewer is the person who will look into the death of someone with learning disabilities. The reviewer is a professional person, for example, a nurse or a social worker. Usually, they will not know the person who has died.



Q3. Why do reviewers need to do a review?

A. Reviewers look into deaths of people with learning disabilities. The reviewer will work out what went well with the person's care, and what did not work well.

Q 5. What was the Confidential Inquiry?

A. It looked at the deaths of some people with learning disabilities between 2010 and 2013. CIPOLD found that some people with learning disabilities received poor quality healthcare.
