Why study history at Bristol?

A shared enthusiasm for history is at the core of our syllabus, which is oriented towards independent research. Our students engage in active, primary source-based research throughout their studies. We offer a wide range of unit choices, which allows you to develop your own pathway through the degree.

We believe that our research should be shared and enjoyed with the wider public and encourage our students to think likewise.

You will have the opportunity to develop your interests through varied teaching formats, choosing from a large range of units reflecting our diverse interests, from the medieval to the modern, and from Britain and Europe to Africa, Asia and the Americas.

Besides the core focus on history you will have the opportunity during your time here to contextualise your studies by taking options beyond your department. You may choose to take units in related or broader subject areas

or in a foreign language. You can also take part in the Bristol Futures programme, which builds knowledge and experience in the fields of innovation and enterprise, global citizenship and sustainable development. You may choose to spend one semester living and studying abroad, an experience which broadens horizons and which employers value highly.

You can also choose to study history with a modern language. We currently offer joint honours degrees with Czech, French, German, Italian, Portuguese, Russian or Spanish. These are four-year degrees in which your time is divided equally between history and your chosen language. The third year is spent in a country appropriate to your chosen language.

Our four-year MArts History with Innovation combines in-depth subject specialism in history with interdisciplinary breadth, creative teamwork and entrepreneurial skills.

What will you study?

When you join the Department of History, you will be on the way to becoming a historian, not just a student of history. You won't just be storing up historical knowledge; you will actively engage in exploring and interpreting the past. What distinguishes our students is that they want to investigate for themselves what happened and why, rather than merely being told about events by someone else.

As our teaching is led by our research, you could find yourself exploring the very latest thinking on topics ranging from the history of witchcraft, to mass media in the British Empire, to modern China.

As historians, we know that communicating our findings to others is the key to our work, helping us refine our ideas and advance historical debates. As an undergraduate at Bristol you will gain the skills to communicate your work clearly and vividly to a wide range of audiences, and the skills to undertake your own original research. This culminates in a 10,000-word dissertation in your final year, based on extensive engagement

with primary sources. Students will also have the opportunity to produce a practice-based dissertation which combines a creative or public-facing output, such as a walking tour, exhibition or podcast, with a 6,000-word reflective report. Because of the emphasis on exploring a variety of sources, the environment of lively discussion, and the encouragement we give you to follow your own passions in history, the dissertations produced are often highly original pieces of work that make significant contributions to historical debates.

Each year the Department of History publishes the best of the annual dissertations produced by our final-year undergraduates and awards a 'best dissertation of the year' prize in recognition of the excellent research work being undertaken by our students. As a department, we are committed to the advancement of historical knowledge and understanding and to research of the highest order – our undergraduates are part of that endeavour.

Teaching methods and assessment

Our teaching is geared to an education at the forefront of the subject and is closely integrated with the acquisition of the key skills and attributes sought by employers for a wide range of careers. Our diverse range of assessments ensures that you gain a thorough training in advanced research, source analysis and sharing your findings in a number of ways. We ensure that you graduate with experience in formal writing and the ability to present knowledge, ideas and arguments in various forms of media. You will be experienced in working individually and in groups, as well as making connections with and communicating to audiences beyond the University.

Our teaching includes a mix of small and medium-sized seminars, lectures, tutorial-supported research and group projects. We place a particular emphasis on small-group seminar teaching, which is embedded at every level of the degree, to promote student discussion and support the development of

students' research. You will be expected to spend longer periods of time on independent study as the course progresses.

Assessment is by coursework essays, dissertations and research projects, as well as written exams and oral presentations. You will be allocated a personal tutor who will follow your progress and give you advice throughout your time at Bristol.

The Department of History is based in the Woodland Road complex, a series of converted Victorian villas at the heart of our Clifton campus.

This degree will develop your marketable, transferable skills, underpinned by the reputation of one of the top universities in the country,* as well as providing a highly rewarding and memorable learning experience.
