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# **Research milestones**

Wishing all of our followers a very Happy New Year! The Cleft Collective Cohort Studies have had another busy six months. Cleft teams in Birmingham, Swansea, Guy's and St. Thomas', Bristol, Manchester, Great Ormond Street, Oxford, Nottingham, Edinburgh, Salisbury, Chelmsford and Liverpool are now recruiting families. Cleft teams in Cambridge, Belfast and Newcastle are also on track to begin recruiting in the coming months.

We now have recruited just over 2,650 individuals (including mothers, fathers, children with cleft and siblings) from almost 940 families.

Birmingham, Swansea, Guy's and St Thomas', Bristol, Great Ormond Street, Salisbury, Oxford and Chelmsford are also recruiting to The Cleft Collective Speech and Language Study.

Once again, the research team is extremely grateful to everyone involved.

Nicky Rumsey is Professor of Appearance Psychology and Co-Director of the Centre for Appearance Research (CAR), which she founded at the University of the West of England in 1992. # What to expect from The Cleft Collective in 2016

With the Birth and Five-Year-Old Cohort Studies and the Speech and Language Study now up and running, we're hoping to expand the research programme in 2016 and begin recruiting families shortly after an antenatal diagnosis of cleft. Information collected during pregnancy will be especially important in helping us to address the genetic and environmental causes of cleft, as well as to identify any additional support that families may need at this time.

We will soon begin to send out questionnaire packs to parents of 3year-olds, and parents of 8-year-olds. This year will also be the first that we collect information from the children themselves.

We're also beginning to formulate an exciting research agenda, based on the research questions important to individuals born with cleft, their parents and the clinicians who deliver cleft services. # Latest research updates



## Using genetics to study the causes and consequences of cleft lip/palate

We are embarking on an exciting new project that uses cutting-edge genetics to help answer the questions: "Which environmental factors cause cleft lip/palate?" and "Are children born with cleft lip/palate predisposed to other adverse outcomes later in life?" This research has the potential to inform public health advice regarding risk factors for cleft lip/palate and improve educational and other outcomes for children born with cleft. We are also creating links with other groups working on the genetics of cleft to collaborate on this and other genetics projects. Welcome to PhD student Laurence Howe who recently joined the team.

## Understanding speech and language development in children born with cleft palate

The Cleft Collective Speech and Language Study has been recruiting for one year now! This study is recruiting babies from the Cleft Collective Birth Cohort who were born with a cleft palate and will collect data on their speech and language development over their first three years. More than 130 parents and children have been recruited so far from six regional centres. Five more centres are due to start recruiting in the next few months. #### Achieving your potential: The impact of cleft lip/palate on school experiences and career aspirations
