A leadership programme for supporting young refugees

There is an urgent need for school leaders across the UK to have access to specialist training in refugee education.

Dr Robert Sharples, an expert in refugee, bilingual and mobile learners will lead a team of 6 PhD students from Bristol and Bath Universities, to create a suite of training materials for UK school leaders, with three commercial education providers: Better Bilingual, Hounslow Language Service and the EAL Academy.

University of Bristol PhD student Jáfia Naftali Câmara says 'It is more important than ever to support school leaders in addressing the educational needs of refugee students.'

University of Bath PhD student, Tom Avery says 'This project addresses many of the continuing professional development gaps for school leaders, that I've seen first-hand'.

The companies will share access to the bespoke academic input, draft the training materials, share them for peer learning & user testing facilitated by the academic team, and then refine the products for commercial use.

Dr Robert Sharples, University of Bristol says 'These companies are well respected for the quality of their work, and they have the capacity to develop and deliver the training and materials for school leaders, at a scale we would never be able to do alone.'

Applying the team's research expertise will overcome the high barrier to creating new educational material.

University of Bristol PhD student Ava Khalfaoui says 'Practical resources will be available to teachers and schools that is based on top quality research.'

Anamaria Fonseca, PhD student at the University of Bristol says 'This project will assist schools in a direct and effective way in addressing the educational needs of refugee students.'

There is currently little institutional expertise in refugee education for school leaders to fall back on. But there is huge demand. The UK government's Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme has prioritised families at risk and aims to resettle 20,000 people across the UK.

University of Bristol PhD student Sophia Soares says 'Having been directly exposed to the lack of appropriate provision for young refugee learners in the UK, I feel strongly about getting this training in place.'

University of Bristol PhD student Martin Preston says 'The needs of the learners are at the heart of this project'.
