Tutor Recruitment Information 2025-26

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Background

- At Bristol Medical School, a key component of the curriculum is Effective Consulting (*EC*) which runs throughout years 1-5 providing integrated learning opportunities in Clinical Reasoning, Clinical Communication and Clinical Skills. In years 1 and 2 Effective Consulting comprises campus-based teaching (EC Labs) and Clinical Contact which alternates between primary and secondary care.
- In **Year 1**, students have 10 EC lab sessions across the year. Three in Foundations of Medicine (*FOM*) and a further seven during the Human Health and Wellbeing block (*HHW*). Each session is themed around our toolkit for teaching and learning about clinical encounters (the toolkit is called **COGConnect***) and aligned to broader topics during FOM and HHW.
- In **Year 2**, students have 12 EC labs. Students revisit the COGConnect* toolkit during Teaching Block 1 (Oct – Dec, 4 sessions). Then, during Teaching block 2 (Jan – June, 8 sessions), the emphasis shifts to putting the whole consultation into practice in the context of symptom-based learning.
- In both years, students participate in a creative reflection of their learning. You can see some examples of previous students work here at <https://outofourheads.net/>.
- Students in Years 1 and 2 are assessed through Team Assessment of Behaviour and Clinical and Communication Skills Assessments.

What are EC Labs?

- Effective Consulting labs are delivered to groups of 8 - 12 students across Years 1 - 3 at Bristol Medical School.
- They provide integrated learning in clinical communication and clinical reasoning working through work with peers and simulated patients.
- An EC Lab is so called to reflect its theoretical and practical nature: *a place of testing, collaboration and participation.*

What is an EC tutor?

- An EC lab tutor facilitates student's experiential learning through delivery of material provided by the central EC team. As EC Lab tutors, doctors facilitate small groups (8-12 students) guiding them in development of early reasoning, communication and clinical skills.
- Our EC lab tutors play a vital part as doctor role models, facilitating the development of collaborative, creative and compassionate groups, and curious individuals. Tutors will support them in their early clinical learning, providing a safe space for them to try out new consulting skills with colleagues and simulated patients.

Who are the EC team?

- A team of clinical medical educators and administrative support:



- *Professor Trevor Thompson is a GP and overall lead for Effective Consulting and Head of Primary Care at Bristol University Medical School*



- *Dr Gayani Herath is a GP, and is Effective Consulting Lead for Year 1, and runs the EC labs across Years 1 & 2.*



- *Dr Juliet Brown is a GP, Year 1 co-lead and leads on implementing Effective Consulting across years 1-5.*



- *Dr Kirsty Brownlie is a GP and is Effective Consulting Lead for Year 3.*



- *Dr Jessica Buchan is a GP, and is Effective Consulting lead for Year 2, and Year 2 co-lead.*



- *Mr Rhys Morton provides admin support and coordination for the Effective Consulting labs delivered in Year 1, Year 2 and Year 3.*

We also work closely with GP colleagues in Primary Care across North and South Bristol and Secondary Care Colleagues in North and South Bristol academies, and a dedicated team of Clinical Teaching Fellows to deliver the clinical provision within Effective Consulting.

What can you expect from the EC team?

- The learning material is released one week in advance for both students and tutors. A briefing email is sent before each tutorial, and the Lab Leads for EC are available to answer questions in advance. Effective Consulting has a dedicated administrator, who can provide logistical, technical and financial information and support. The EC team and group of tutors provide and facilitate a community of support and tutor led learning which we have found invaluable both for sharing top tips and any difficulties.
- Training in the use of all teaching materials and delivery methods is provided. Support is ongoing throughout the year.
- Teaching sessions are remunerated at a clinical payment rate, training is provided.

What remuneration is available?

- Payment is for sessions taught only and is commensurate with University Clinical Teacher rates. The rate for Effective Consulting teaching in 2025-26 is **£86.66 per hour** for self-employed individuals and **£65.00 per hour** (*inclusive of annual leave entitlement*) for Teaching Support Role (TSR) contracted staff.
- There will be more details to follow in a dedicated payment FAQ's document following appointment of the EC tutors.
- **For internal staff** - EC tutoring would be factored into your existing workplan following discussion with your line manager, and would count towards your continuous professional development (CPD) and teaching commitment/requirement within contracted hours (i.e. this CPD would be in lieu of the payment outlined above). EC tutor roles at the University can be evidenced as teaching in both your academic and clinical appraisal. If you currently work in a university role less than full time and would like to take on EC tutoring in addition to your current role, please get in touch.

EC Tutor – Role Summary

All our EC Lab tutors are clinicians, and all the learning and teaching material is centrally developed and provided, along with clear session plans for tutors.

These are the sorts of activities that an EC Lab tutor will be involved in:

- Follow the teaching programme provided by the EC team which outlines clear objectives and structured activities.
- Facilitate all core learning material and cover the stated learning objectives each session
- Prepare for sessions by reading the tutor guide and associated material. You are welcome to attend/watch the preparatory lecture as part of your preparation although there is no additional payment for doing so.
- Guide and support students as they first learn about, and then begin to practise the clinical communication, clinical reasoning and clinical skills needed for Effective Consultations. Help students bring together theory and practice, content and process in the Clinical Consultation.
- Work with actors as simulated patients
- Facilitate a safe group space, with good group dynamics
- Be a clinical and professional role model for early years students
- Understand and be able to implement the principles of good feedback
- Provide feedback to students and help students to develop their own reflective practice
- Facilitate peer led feedback
- Identify students in difficulty and be familiar with university protocols for signposting to appropriate resources
- Record and report student absences and lateness
- Ensure concerns about student academic progress and/or pastoral concerns are raised with the EC Year leads
- Respond to student requests for feedback (Team Assessment of Behaviour) for their ePortfolio
- Provide feedback on student's creative assignments: full guidance and support is provided.
- Be open to peer review and willing to develop your own practice
- Learn from colleagues and be prepared to share learning with tutor peers

EC Labs FAQ

- **How long is a tutorial?** *Each EC Lab teaching session is 1 hr 50 minutes.*
- **When do tutorials occur?** *All sessions occur on a Thursday. There are 3 potential time slots (see Appendix - please note these are fixed due to student timetables and room allocations). Year 1 and Year 2 EC Labs occur in different weeks.*
- **What are the teaching dates?** *Teaching dates are currently provisional (see appendix), but we acknowledge that you will sign up to the dates as offered. We ask that tutors commit to delivering all scheduled sessions throughout the academic year. We commit to providing at least 6 weeks' notice of a change in date and would ask that you also provide at least 6 weeks' notice if you are unable to teach because your clinical circumstances have changed.*
- **How much preparation is required?** *Preparation of approximately 1 hour is allocated for each session. In total, one teaching session attracts 3 hours of payment.*
- **How many sessions can I apply for?** *You can apply to be either a Year 1 EC lab tutor or a Year 2 EC Lab tutor. Please note your preferences will be considered but we may not be able to allocate all tutors to their preferred year group or number of sessions. The maximum number of EC Lab sessions that one tutor can run regularly is 2, with ad hoc cover in addition.*
- **How are tutors selected?** *We do not run interviews for this role. It is a ranked selection and matching process which considers the service delivery needs of our course and the availability of eligible tutors. The link to the tutor application form is below.*
- **What training is provided?** *Relevant CPD will be provided. CPD is funded at a single flat payment for the academic year, which includes mandatory attendance at the pre-course workshop and mandatory associated e-learning for all tutors.*

Reporting To:

The EC lab tutor will report to the Year 1 and 2 EC Leads.

Formal line management and appraisal remain within the EC tutor's clinical environment. The EC team do not provide formal appraisal documentation for this role.

Application Details

- All applications from suitably qualified individuals will be considered. All posts are offered for one academic year.
- The recruitment period is open between **30th April 2025 – 29th May 2025** (but may be extended if recruitment needs are not met during this time period). Your application form will be considered by the Year leads and matched to our teaching needs. All applicants will be notified of the outcome in **early July**.
- We anticipate that occupational checks will take place in **July - September** and all staff should be registered with the relevant university departments by the start of September. If offered a post please ensure you respond to requests for information in a timely manner, as delays may affect your ability to access university teaching resources in time for the first tutorial.
