How to apply for grant funding to help put learning from LeDeR reviews into action

LeDeR steering groups and other partners could be eligible for grant funding for projects which showcase good practice around citizen and patient involvement in healthcare. NHS grants of up to £2,500 are available to voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations. This could be a good opportunity for groups working with family carer networks and self-advocacy organisations to further improve how learning from LeDeR reviews is put into action. <u>Click here</u> for more details.

Information for LeDeR reviewers has been updated on LeDeR website

The LeDeR team at the University of Bristol is currently updating its helpful information and resources for LeDeR reviewers and Local Area Contacts. Reviewer and Local Area Contact details must be updated to prevent data breaches

The LeDeR team at Bristol University needs to be informed promptly when a reviewer or Local Area Contact (LAC) leaves, or changes, their role with the programme. This is to avoid a potential breach of data which could happen if people continued to have access to the LeDeR Review System, despite having left the programme. LACs have responsibility for ensuring reviewers' details have been updated, while Regional Coordinators need to update LAC details. This is best done by email, at <u>leder-team@bristol.ac.uk</u>. The LeDeR admin team can also notified between 10am and 3pm, Monday to Friday, by ringing 0117 331 0686.

Local Area Contacts can now access a report on the progress of all reviews in their area

Local Area Contacts can now access a report within the LeDeR Review System showing all the reviews within their CCG(s) area and their current progress. It can be found by selecting 'Sites' and 'LeDeR Review System' in the navigation bar. The system is updated at the end of every day so any updates made to reviews will not show in these reports until the following day.
