


Leading Al research and discovery


We are leaders in artificial intelligence (AI) research and education. Bristol was crowned 'Al University of The Year' at the National Al Awards 2024.

As an Al leader, Bristol has been chosen by the government to host a new national supercomputer research facility, focused on artificial intelligence. To be known as Isambard-Al. the new facility will serve as a resource for researchers and industry experts spearheading Al innovation and scientific discovery - and places Bristol at the centre of the Al revolution.

Creating sonic wallpaper inspired by a moth's wing

Our researchers, who recently discovered that moth wings offer acoustic protection from bat echolocation calls, have been studying whether their structure could inform better performing sound absorbing panels, when not moving in free space. This breakthrough and potential to create these ultrathin panels could revolutionise noisecancelling technology.





For the last 30 years, researchers have been collecting, analysing and studying a huge range of health and lifestyle data from families in Bristol and the surrounding area. With more than 27,000 participants from three generations, it's the most detailed study of its kind in the world. CO90s informs global research papers on topics such as diet and fitness, parenting patterns, autism, allergies, environment and COVID-19.

Esther was one of over 14,000 pregnant women to sign up to CO90s in 1992, and now her daughter and grandchildren are all part of the study.




A greener nuclear future

Nuclear power – alongside renewable energy sources – is likely to become increasingly important as we move away from fossil fuels and transition to low-carbon societies. Our researchers are using pioneering ways to understand how radioactive materials and nuclear waste are managed, protected and disposed of so we can improve the safety of nuclear power, making it viable for our future.

Revolutionising blood disorder treatments

In a world-first clinical trial, red blood cells grown in a laboratory have now been transfused into another person by a UK team including University of Bristol researchers. If proved safe and effective. manufactured blood cells could revolutionise treatments for people with blood disorders.

Cutting-edge facilities

Our campus is home to state-of-the-art laboratories, extensive multimedia centres and the latest technology. Some of our facilities include:

- Ultra Low Noise Laboratories in the Nanoscience and Quantum Information Building.
- The Anechoic Chamber, a key facility for wireless research.
- Coldrick Observatory, a six-metre radio telescope for astrophysics research on the roof of the School of Physics.
- Smart Cinema the world's first fully instrumented auditorium that monitors audience reactions through biometric responses.

- Language lab, audioediting studio and foreign materials library for modern languages.

Study spaces

Our eight libraries house the largest academic collection in South-West England. 24-hour study spaces across the University are available for quiet study or group working, and you'll have access to more than 2,000 computers and Wi-Fi across campus.

Specialist resources

Many departments hold their own extensive archives and special collections:

- The Theatre Collection is an accredited museum and research centre dedicated to the study of British theatre history, and the Earth Science Collection contains over 100,000 samples of scientific and historical importance.
- The University's Botanic Garden is home to more than 4,500 plant species and is a fascinating place to study plant evolution.

OUR UNIVERSITY AT THE HEART OF BRISTOL



The University has three campuses across Bristol, all with a distinct character and setting. Regular public transport connects the campuses to each other and other parts of the city, with some of **Bristol's best** shops, cafés, bars and museums easily accessible from your lectures, labs or library.

Historic meets modern

You'll study in a range of unique buildings. On the Clifton campus, you'll find the Grade II-listed Fry Building housing the Mathematics department and the Victorian villas on leafy Woodland Road for the Arts and Humanities departments. Newer additions include the Life Sciences Building - with an outdoor living wall that is home to a variety of plant species - and the UK's largest Earthquake Engineering facility in the Queen's Building.

On the edge of the city, Bristol Veterinary School is based at Langford campus, a 105-hectare estate with beautiful gardens and parkland.

Temple Quarter Enterprise Campus (TQEC)

Opening in 2026, this new campus represents the biggest investment in the University's history. This cutting-edge facility will bring students, staff, community organisations and industry partners under one roof to tackle society's greatest challenges together.

For undergraduate study, it will be home to the Business School and the Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship. Flexible teaching rooms and study areas range from collaborative spaces to low-distraction rooms. Innovative facilities such as the Design Factory and Maker Space will

make TQEC an exciting and dynamic learning environment.

Dedicated space for industry and community partners in the building will facilitate networks, provide students with access to potential future employers and create more opportunities for students to integrate with the city.

Space to unwind

There are plenty of places across our campuses to take a break between classes. You can choose to go to the gym, enjoy some green space at the tranquil Royal Fort Gardens or relax in a more social environment, like the Bristol SU Loft or Living Room.



The largest city in the South West, Bristol is known for its fiercely independent spirit, creative culture and vibrant yet laid-back atmosphere.

A community made up of people from 180 countries, Bristol's distinct neighbourhoods reflect the city's diverse character. With all the buzz of a major city without the expanse, Bristol is truly walkable.

The Clifton campus is only a short walk to the picturesque Clifton, where you'll find the iconic suspension bridge. Browse the shops on Park Street during a study break, at the top of which is the Wills Memorial Building, home to our graduation ceremonies.

Wander down to the bustling harbourside, where you'll find restaurants housed in shipping containers, an independent cinema and boats-turned-pubs floating on the water.

Immerse yourself in art and culture at the museums and art galleries around the vibrant city centre. Discover Bristol's shopping quarter, try local street food, party at a day festival or watch live music at grassroots venues.

Venture further north to find more street art and indie music venues in **Stokes Croft**, and wander along Gloucester Road, the longest chain of independent shops in Europe. Head to the south of the river to visit **Bedminster**, home to Upfest, Europe's largest street art festival. Spot iconic hot air balloons ascending from **Ashton Court**, one of Bristol's 400+ gardens, parks and nature reserves.

Just outside the city you can hike and cycle through beautiful countryside, or even catch a wave at a man-made surfing lake.

Our brand-new Temple Quarter Enterprise Campus is conveniently located next to Bristol Temple Meads station, the largest rail hub in the west of England. Less than two hours from London and surrounded by beautiful countryside, Bristol is ideally situated for exploring the South West while remaining well connected to major cities.



Located in Clifton, Stoke Bishop, and the city centre, we offer a wide variety of accommodation options to suit your preferences.

There are over 40 residences to choose from, each with their own

characteristics and reasons why students love living there. We offer accommodation options to suit everyone, including adapted and accessible rooms, single-sex, alcohol-free, and mature student options.

Our catered residences provide fresh, nutritious meals to cater to all dietary requirements, while our self-catered residences feature larger kitchens for those who prefer to cook for themselves.

The Clifton residences are just a short walk from the independent shops, cafés, and restaurants of Clifton Village. The Stoke Bishop residences are nestled near the open green space of Clifton Down, and the city centre residences put you right on the doorstep of a bustling area filled with shops, cafés, bars, and Bristol's harbourside.

All our residences are within walking or cycling distance, or a short bus journey, from campus. All undergraduate students living in university residences receive a free bus pass.

A WELCOMING COMMUNITY

All students living in University of Bristol accommodation can access 24/7 support from a trained team of Residential Wellbeing Advisers. All residences have a Junior Common Room – a studentled social committee that organises events and activities throughout the year.

Representatives from your residence will take part in Junior Common Room meetings and plan and deliver events to help you meet other students in your halls. The Student Communities team delivers regular events, close to our halls of residences, for our students to build connections with one another and foster a sense of community.

Student Accommodation team

Our Student Accommodation team can help you find somewhere to live and offers advice on University allocated and private rented accommodation throughout your time at Bristol. They provide specialist advice, for example for students with disabilities or with young families, and will do everything they can to make sure you feel at home in Bristol.

WELLBEING AND SUPPORT

At Bristol, we want you to feel both independent and supported. We'll help you manage your health alongside your studies.

We have a comprehensive range of services to support your health and wellbeing. Our on-campus Students' Health Service provides the full range of NHS GP services: our Student Wellbeing Service offers help and guidance if you're experiencing challenges; and our Student Counselling Service offers ways to maintain positive mental health.

Making space for your wellbeing

The Multifaith Chaplaincy offers confidential pastoral and spiritual support and a welcoming space for all faiths and none. Student societies, such as the Wellbeing Network, provide a place to talk about wellbeing and connect with others.

Disability Services

Students who come to Bristol with ongoing health or mental health conditions, sensory impairments or mobility or specific learning difficulties can access additional advice and support from Disability Services. Academic support

We provide academic support to help you recognise your unique learning style, discover new skills and get the most out of your studies by providing a range of services, including:

- A personal tutor who you'll meet with regularly throughout your time at university.
- Skills development and training via the Study Skills service available to all students.
- Peer support, such as peer-assisted study sessions led by students from later years of your course.

In 2022, Bristol became one of the first universities to receive the University Mental Health Charter Award, recognising our approach to improving mental health and wellbeing across the whole community.



As a University of Bristol student. you'll be a member of Bristol Students' Union (SU), which represents the student voice. provides you with advice and support, and offers access to clubs, societies and projects.

Bristol SU is student-led and supports more than 350 societies, sports clubs and volunteering projects. The SU will run your Welcome Week and organises hundreds of events throughout the year. It also provides advice about academic and housing issues and provides practical services, such as a lettings agency.



Venues

The Richmond Building is home to Bristol SU activity spaces and events. Here you can find the Balloon Bar. a space where you can meet friends for a drink or relax after studying. two theatres where you can enjoy or get involved in performances, a pottery studio, music practice rooms, a radio studio, dance studios and more. It also houses the Anson Rooms, the SU's largest event space, hosting both SU and studentled events.

Bristol SU staff are based in Senate House and there are other SU spaces within this central building, including the Living Room, a place designed for you to relax, unwind and connect with others, and the Bristol SU Loft, a collaborative co-working space perfect for group projects.

There's also a sensory room for students who might need a dedicated space to focus on or engage with their senses.

Representation

A full-time elected officer team and over 900 academic reps are here to represent your views and needs to the SU and the University. Alongside this, there are a number of student community organisers who create communities and enable change for marginalised groups.

Volunteering

Bristol SU supports student-led projects which are all run by passionate student volunteers. The SU also connects hundreds of students with volunteering opportunities across Bristol, giving you the chance to make a positive impact on the city you'll call home.



Gain a new perspective and internationalise your degree by spending time abroad, with the Bristol Abroad team on hand to guide you through the process.

Study and work abroad

If your subject offers a course with study abroad, you have the opportunity to study abroad during the third year of your four-year degree.

Current partner universities include the University of California, the University of Sydney, National University of Singapore, the University of Copenhagen and more. Studying abroad provides students with valuable intercultural and employability skills, along with enriching personal development opportunities. You'll pay a reduced tuition fee for your year abroad and you may also be eligible for student loans and grants while you're away. Languages students also have the option to work overseas during their year abroad.


Summer and shortterm programmes

FEES AND FUNDING

Studying for a degree is an investment in your future. We can provide information and guidance to help you navigate fees, costs and funding opportunities.

Fees and costs

Tuition fees for 2026 entry are expected to be confirmed and published on our website in summer 2025. For more information regarding tuition fees, please visit bristol.ac.uk/ug-fees-funding

Accommodation fees will depend on the type of accommodation you choose. If you live in University residences. your fee will include all energy rates, internet, basic contents insurance. a bus pass (for students living in undergraduate or mixed undergraduate and postgraduate accommodation), and a Social Fund contribution. More information can be found at bristol.ac.uk/ accommodation

Living expenses, such as food, travel, books, clothing and entertainment, will vary by individual circumstances. Making the most of student discounts and deals and taking on a part-time job are some of the ways to save money and budget well as a student.

Government funding

Eliqible UK students can apply for a loan to cover the full cost of tuition fees. If you're a full-time UK student under the age of 60 and studying for your first degree, you may be eligible for a maintenance loan towards your living expenses in addition to your tuition fee loan. 
